



Howard and Fulbright: *A Partnership Rooted in Scholarship*

It has been an impactful year for Howard University and the Fulbright Program. This fall, Howard was named among Fulbright's top 20 HBCU Institutional Leaders for the 2024-2025 academic year.

We are proud to announce that six of our distinguished Howard graduates have been awarded prestigious 2025-2026 Fulbright U.S. Student Program grants.

The Fulbright Program is an international academic exchange program founded in 1946. The organization's mission is to increase mutual understanding and support friendly and peaceful relations between the people of the United States and people of other countries. More than 400,000 scholars from over 160 countries have participated in the program since 1946 – including more than 165 Howard alumni.

This year's Fulbright grant recipients plan to use their Howard education to create positive change in the world. After completing law school at Howard, Ellis Walton, (J.D. '25) began his career as an environmental attorney in Chicago. Through Fulbright, he will attend the London School of Economics and Political Science in pursuit of an MSc in environmental policy and regulation. After completing his studies, Ellis plans to continue shaping and implementing policies that advance environmental justice.

Diane Fakinlede (Biology Degree '25) is a Howard University summa cum laude biology graduate and a 2024 Astronaut Scholar. She continues her scientific pursuits at the Aarhus University in Denmark where she will investigate the role of protein aggregation in immune cell activation and its potential link to Parkinson's disease. 

Your IRA Can Move Howard Forward, Tax Free

If you are age 70½ or older, you can transfer as much as \$108,000 annually from your IRA directly to Howard. Often called a QCD or Qualified Charitable Distribution, your gift will support our mission and have an immediate impact, bridging the gap for students affected by adjustments to federal student loans. Additionally, if you are over age 73, your gift may count toward your required minimum distribution.
